The accomplishments of our members chronicled in <u>Celebrating Our 35th Anniver sary (1973 2008)</u> show how a society that celebrates the past becomes a dynamic part of the present and future. (The book is still available to purchase from Ways and Means Committee or from the CGHS website.)

Several articles in this newsletter describe more recent contributions by CGHS and its members such as the completion of the <u>Evergreen Cemetery</u> <u>Online Project</u>, the addition of the <u>Colorado Territory Civil War Volunteer</u> <u>Equipment Records 1861 1865</u> to the CGHS Online Archives, donations to local libraries, and a genealogy presentation to the Littleton Public Schools' Adult Options program. Also included in this issue of the newsletter are pictures of our dedicated officers and committee members. Many thanks to all of you for your contributions this year.

Workshops and presentations in 2009 have helped members expand their genealogy skills in mapping, online obituary searches and use of the Denver public library research services. No doubt the excellent pro grams and workshops set up by our education committee have contrib uted to an average of 68 people at each program this year. Bemis Public Library Donations – March 2009

Early ineteenth Century German Settlers in Ohio, Kentucky and Other States, compiled by Clifford Neal Smith, 12004, 322 p. Six volumes combined in one book of *Der Deutsche Pioniere*, German American monthly newsmagazine items like obituaries, family histories, settlements, and news published from 1868 1885. Contains wonderful details on thousands of early German families. Each volume has a separate introduction and index.

Welsh Founders of Pennsylvania, by Thomas Allen Glenn, 1970, 366 p. Reprint containing both Vol I and Vol II of 1911 13 publication packed with hundreds of detailed early Welsh family pedigrees, many extensive. Unfortunately, no indexes, but offers a rich Welsh Colonial reading experience.

Kentuckians in Missouri, by Stuart Seely Sprague, 1983, 209 p. Compiled from many early county history books, this offers a tabular listing by county of the Kentucky migrant, birth date, parents, place of birth, and place in Mis souri where they settled. Extensive index with over 4,000 names.

Google Your Family Tree, by Daniel M. Lynch, 2008, 352 p. Written with the sole purpose of helping family his tory researchers use the multitude of Google Search features. Features clear examples of tips for effective searching of data, maps, photos, and more. An excellent book! Joint Purchase of Jan and Gary Routh.

Denver Public Library Donations – March 2009

Albemarle County, Virginia Court Papers 1744 1783, Benjamin B. Weisiger III, 1995, 106 p. The Albemarle Co. court books are among the few surviving early county records due to extensive British record destruction during the Revolutionary War. This fully indexed compilation of abstracts contains 40 years of activities such as debts, tobacco sales, arrests, slanders, deeds, and guardianships. Out of print book by highly respected author. Joint Purchase of Jan and Gary Routh.

Goochland County, Virginia – Colonial Wills and Deeds 1736 1742, Benjamin B. Weisiger III, 1997, 102 p. Complete abstract of Goochland Deed Book Nr. 3 covering early settlement expansion of the Virginia Piedmont land grants. Extensive land dealings of numerous Virginia families which later supplied so many Revolutionary War sol diers. Fully indexed out of print book by respected author. Joint Purchase of Jan and Gary Routh.

History of Bonner County, Idaho, Compiled by Walter S. Franklin, 1991, 743 p. Interesting Centennial history of the last county formed in Idaho. Covers early families who struggled to settle and cultivate land which had been ex tensively logged and left as waste. Full index. Gift of Mary Lou King.

History of Pella, Iowa 1847 1987, Pella Historical Society, 1989, 2 Vols 1,422 p. Fascinating family and town his tory of early Dutch settlement in Iowa. Pella has preserved its Dutch history and continues to celebrate their heritage as a tourist destination. Wonderful books found discarded by neighbors and rescued by Jini Smith.

Evergreen Online Cemetery Project Completed

Valerie Eichler Lair, Evergreen Cemetery Project Coordinator, recently announced completion of the online database for the Ever green Cemetery records.

Part of the US GenWeb Tombstone Transcription Project, the database includes all burials from 1856 to 2006. The data is alphabetical and includes: birth date, death date, burial date, block, lot, space, fu neral home as well as comments such as marriage and military infor mation, organizations (Masons, IOOF, etc.) and information regard ing whether an individual was moved to a different cemetery. United Kingdom Research: Esther Rantzen Shows You How to Trace Your Family Tree Without Spending the Family Fortune

General Register Office information now available on Directgov.

Following programmes like the BBC's "Who Do You Think You Are?", interest in genealogy has grown rap idly in recent years. Some commercial companies charge as much as GBP30.00 for a birth certificate but each [United Kingdom] certificate costs from just GBP7.00 if you order online via Directgov.

Public information about registering births, marriages and deaths in England and Wales has moved from the GRO (General Register Office) website and is now available on the government's supersite, Directgov, from 7 April 2009.

The GRO online ordering service currently receives up to 7,000 applications a day and 2.5 million views per month. More than 2 million certificate applications are made each year, the vast majority of which are investi gating their family tree, others need a certificate for le gal or administrative purposes and 90 per cent of these applications are made online. Other significant areas of interest include finding out about places to get married, marriage fees, and registering a birth.

Directgov, the government's flagship digital service, is now hosting information on registering births, mar riages, civil partnerships and deaths, including details of how adopted adults can access their original birth records or place their details on the Adoption Contact Register. All the information is in plain English and the move to Directgov will improve public access to these services.

Jayne Nickalls, Chief Executive of Directgov, said: "This is a wonderful addition to the Directgov family and we are delighted to begin hosting this information. People don't need to pay over the odds for what is an essential legal and historical document of life in the UK. Directgov can play a key role in helping people to ac cess it and in saving money." James Hall, the Registrar General for England and Wales said: "I am confident that all those accessing Directgov for information on topics such as getting married, registering a birth or what to do after a death, will find the information clear and helpful. People using the online ordering service will come through directly to the General Register Office, the only holders of the national record for Eng land and Wales." Television presenter and founder of Childline. Esther Rantzen, traced her own family history on the BBC's television series, "Who Do You Think You Are?" Esther said: "Unraveling the secrets of my family was an incredible and emotional journey, one that I am pleased to have taken, even if some of the truths uncovered were hard to accept. Finding out where you come from helps inform who you are, and I am delighted to know that more people will be able to make their own personal discoveries using Directgov in an accessible and affordable way."

Colorado State Archives Database Updated

The Colorado State Archives would like to advise the Columbine Genealogical Society of this recent addition to our Historical Records/ Name Database. There are just under 200,000 names that are recorded in what is called the Denver Lot & Block Index Books (1862 1917) and these names are now accessible via the free database search on our web site. Many of your society members are probably aware that the City of Denver was originally part of Arapahoe County until 1902. The index can help researchers find information about a particular property and the owners in the given time period. It also refers to the deed book number where the actual property deed is recorded. This will be an invaluable resource to assist researchers in searching the history of who owned a specific home/lot in the City of Denver. In addition, there are a number of other new records that have been indexed and posted to the database for researchers to use.
