
#### WHY IS GENEALOGY IMPORTANT?

A recent article at <a href="www.genealogyintime.com">www.genealogyintime.com</a>
answered this question with practical reasons.

Now we all have our own reasons for doing genealogy. As we get older and have more time on our hands, do we include genealogy on our bucket list? Is it a family hobby passed on from one generation to the next? Do we want our descendants to know where they came from? Did a school assignment to make a family tree mark the starting point? Practical reasons for why climbing the family tree is important include:

- 1. To validate family stories.
- 2. To see if we are related to any famous people.
- 3. To trace an ancestor's involvement in an historical event.
- 4. To assess the risk of certain medical conditions that run in families.
- 5. To gain a family inheritance.
- 6. To find birth parents of an adopted child..
- 7. To establish proof of paternity.
- 8. To abide by a religious tenet.
- 9. To document community history.
- 10. To provide insight into a famous or royal family's history.
- 11. To provide proof of lineage to join heritage societies.
- 12. To preserve family traditions.
- 13. To preserve family culture.
- 14. To reconnect with family.
- 15. To pass on a family legacy.

So as we start a new year maybe now is a good time to re-visit the reasons why we do genealogy. Such a practice might just lead us to new branches on our family trees.

#### 2013 Salt Lake City Trip!

We plan to arrive in Salt Lake on Monday, May 6th, and will leave on Saturday, May 11th or Sunday, May 12th. For planning purposes, please remember that Sunday, May 12th, is Mother's Day.

The group will be staying at the Salt Lake Plaza Hotel. If you are planning to be there Monday to Saturday, hotel rates are approximately \$240 per person, double occupancy. We will not be going through a travel agent this time, and someone from each room will need to make the reservation. 
You will also need to make your own airline reservation. As of December 12th airline rates are between \$140 and \$160 on Frontier and Southwest.

# This Is How It Ends by Kathleen MacMahon. New York: Grand Central Publishing, 2012.

I just finished reading a library book that may be of interest to others who do genealogy. It sounds like Genealogy 101 in fiction form. The opening sentence reads, "It was a wet Monday morning in mid-autumn when Bruno Boylan finally set foot in the land of his forefathers" (page 1). Suddenly out of a job in the United States before the Obama-McCain presidential election, he travels to Dublin, Ireland as the last of the Boylans to meet his cousins several times removed who have a different reaction to his arrival than what he anticipates. Addie "kept having to remind herself that he was her cousin. It didn't feel like they were from the same family. It didn't feel like they were from the same species...To Addie, Irish America was something you wanted nothing to do with. Irish Americans were fat people in check trousers and baseball hats who descended out of tour buses onto Nassau Street and waddled into Blarney Woollen Mills to buy Aran jumpers. They were redfaced people in sneakers who hung around the National Library trying to trace their family tree. They were people who attended fund-raising dinners in hotel ballrooms in Boston and New York and talked nonsense about the North. They spoke too loud and they pronounced all the place names wrong. The very thought of an Irish American in search of his roots was enough to make you squirm.

Of course Bruno was oblivious to all the negative connotations he was arousing. He had no idea of all the prejudices and petty resentments he was stirring up. He was under the impressions that he had nothing to be ashamed of '(page 47-8).

I especially liked the part in Chapter 16, where "Bruno had started working on his family tree.

When you looked at it on paper it was a winter tree. It was a naked-looking thing, all bare branches ending in blank spaces. There was no foliage and no color, no life in it yet. Only on the far left-hand side of the page was there any indication of growth. Starting with his grandfather, Bruno had constructed a system of straight lines and neat boxes dropping down through the generations..."

Next, Bruno realizes he should have done some preparation before he embarked on his trip. "He should have done some foundation work. Before he left New York, he should have questioned his sisters...For some reason he had imagined that his search would start only when he got here" (page 130).

Fortunately Bruno meets a genealogist at the National Library

who gives him some much-needed advice.

Then, in order to help Bruno, Addie asks her father, Hugh, about their common ancestors. Unfortunately Hugh's attitude shows in his statement to her, "Firewood, that's all it's good for, our family tree" (page 137).

In addition, Addie and Bruno take a genealogy research trip. Their "country cousins" invite them for tea. Addie is horrified to visit them, has no recollection of them, and has never even known of their existence, but she feels guilty about her feelings after she meets them. "She was overcome by everything she didn't know, by all the things these women seemed to know about her. She didn't remember any of it. She felt as if she'd walked into a room and suddenly people were jumping our from behind the couches and curtains and they were shouting, surprise!" Then, Bruno and Addie go to the family graveyard, where Bruno meticulously copies gravestone information in his notebook, while Addie waits for some kind of emotion to come over her, but none does (page 174-5).

In Ireland Bruno settles into a routine of going to the library daily and becoming a part of the "same silent community" of researchers (page 240). "He would unfold the family tree, spreading it out flat on the desk and allowing his eyes to wander over the page.

There was an alchemy involved in this work, there was the potential for some magic. If you collected enough facts, there was the possibility of conjuring some life out of them. All of a sudden a story would rise, like a vaporous cloud that has been produced by mixing two chemicals together in a laboratory. And Bruno was the magician, he was the one bringing his ancestors back to life" (page 241).

Eventually Bruno and Addie have their first fight. During it, Addie remarks, "I bet you had this really happy childhood," she said. "That's why you're so keen on talking about the past. People who had happy childhoods always love to talk about the past" (page 244).

This Is How It Ends ends sadly and far too abruptly. That is my only criticism. I marvel at how Kathleen MacMahon wove genealogy into this love story between two mature adults, but I wanted more of the author's unique descriptions of genealogy.



#### Editor's Notes

Is everyone ready for 2013? What are your genealogy goals for the coming year? Where will you search? As you can see from page 1, even a vegetable can may be a place you'll find information about your ancestors!

I want to spend a day or two at the library at the new History Colorado Center. I have relatives from both sides of my family who came to Colorado in the 1880's. I am sure I can find information on some of them in the library. Also, I need to spend more time at the Denver Public Library's Western History and Genealogy Floor.

My wife recently submitted her DNA to the new AncestryDNA test that uses some of the latest DNA autosomal testing technology as a more comprehensive way to find family across all lines in your family tree. So one test covers both sides—maternal and paternal—and is equally effective for both men and women. Some of the hits she is getting are just a few generations back. The test I had done a couple of years ago was fraternal only and gave results back as much as 20 generations. This info is not very good for my research. Seems I am of Polish descent. The matches I've received are mainly from Poland and may go back as far as 20 generations before there is a connection. It leaves me with more questions than answers. So the next time they have a sale, I'll do the DNA autosomal.


In the mean time, I'll go back and Google my ancestors again. I just never know when someone will post new info that will help me out.. Editor's Note: Right after I wrote this, I received an Ancestry email with information on my paternal grandmother. Our family always thought that she had an illegitimate, 2-year-old son when she married my grandfather in 1913. The new info indicates that she was married when she had him and listed her first husband's name. From that, I was able to find her in the 1910 U.S. Census. Isn't genealogy amazing!
