

# Google Hacks 100 Industrial-Strength Tips & Tools

By Tara Calishain & Rael Dornfest

Available in English and Spanish Published by O'Reilly

In 1996 Google was born and has become the most widely used search engine. It is constantly being developed to make it and the WEB more useful. The book **Google Hacks 100 Industrial-Strength tips & Tools** by Tara Calishain & Rael Dornfest was written as a collection of shortcuts of quick solutions and techniques for searching Google syntax. Tara is an editor of search engine technical literature and Rael is a technology expert for various companies. They have utilized input from many people who are consulters and developers of computer software, search engines and other IT services to write this book.

The "Hacks" were put together as shortcuts for searching Google syntax and would be especially useful to computer experts, but it is not user friendly for everyday users of the Internet. It is extremely challenging to those of us who want simple quick searches and I would not recommend this book to the casual Internet user. If your goal is to know <u>all</u> the ins and outs of Google Searching—this book is for you.

Google is a full-text search engine that indexes full web pages, not just titles and or descriptions. Google is used most often because it has the greatest number of pages to search. It has newsgroups, stock quotes, dictionary definitions, and directories of all kinds including phone books. You are able to search up to ten keywords at a time and get useful results.

Using search syntax allows you to refine your searches and get more options. This book gives an insight into the workings of a search engine and offers clever programming tricks, shortcuts and inside information. It requires a fair amount of technical knowledge and is most useful for webmasters and or programmers who can fine-tune their uses of the Google search engine. This is a comprehensive book of Google information that provides users strategies for greater uses of this search engine and of course more information and effectiveness.

Reading the 1<sup>st</sup> chapter will satisfy the casual Internet researcher. Leave the rest of the book to the experts unless you're up to the challenge of "Google" Syntax. In any case, you should be prepared to become frustrated while trying to understand the language of computer "geeks" and information "techies" along the way.

If your goal is to advance your "Google knowledge" for your research you will want to check out this book.

# **Bemis Public Library Donations – November 2008**

**Hopewell Friends History, 1734-1934, Frederick County, Virginia,** compiled by a Joint Committee of Hopewell Friends, 1936, Clearfield reprint 2007, 671 p.
