Twenty year Members (continued)

Ray Harrell

Born in 1931 in Kearney, Nebraska, Ray was the second of four sons of Arthur G. and Margaret E. (Weinle) Harrell. Ray graduated high school in Jefferson City, Missouri. He married Delores McKay in 1955; they had three daughters.

Ray served in the USAF for four years. In 1958 he received his engineering degree from Wichita University. His first job was as a design engineer for Chance Vought Aircraft in Dallas, Texas. Ray moved to Denver In 1960 and began working for The Martin Company (now Lockheed Martin). He retired from Lockheed in 1989.

Ray started in genealogy after finding out about an ancestor who fought in the Revolutionary War. He joined CGHS and learned the "how to" from classes and the wonderful people at the society. The past several years he has been extracting death dates from the Denver Post and Rocky Mountain News for the Denver Public Library's death index.

John Mossman

John Mossman has loved history since he was a youngster. His history professor in college suggested he might consider changing his major (he didn't).

About a year before retirement John decided to take up researching his family history. He now belongs to six genealogical societies across the country including CGHS, where he served two terms as 2nd Vice President. John is also a member of the "Sons of the American Revolution", "First Family of Gallia County, Ohio". A member of "First Family of Colorado", John's Colorado roots date back to 1835.

John is now doing genealogy research for his wife Bettie's family and his grandchildren as well as helping several other family members with genealogy.

Bev Nelson

"There are three passions in my life: my family of one husband, three children, three in-law children, and five living grandchildren; the Native American Indian art and culture; and genealogical research."

Bev is a graduate of the University of Colorado with a BS of Ed and is retired owner/director of the Southwestern Gallery. In May she concluded two years as Regent of the Mount Rosa Chapter of the NSDAR. She is currently serving as President of the US Daughters of 1812 and Registrar for the Colorado Chapter of the Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America. (She uses the archives of the lineage societies to preserve her research.) Since all of her ancestors (less one) were on these shores prior to 1776, the research has concentrated in twelve of the original thirteen colonies (no Rhode Island). Just a year and a half ago she published her family history: "The Ancestors and Descendants of Clinton M. Ellison and Edna Hazel Conover." Bev still feels that one of the best decisions of her life was to sign up for Ann Lisa Pearson's genealogy class a little over 20 years ago.

Dorry Rice

Dorry joined CGHS in 1989 soon after she retired from teaching primary grades for Littleton School District for 20 years. Genealogy has been a favorite pastime for Dorry since she was 12 years old when she pestered her grandmother with questions about their lineage. Researching her answers enabled her to join the National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Last year, Dorry published a poetry book, "What Was Dorry Thinking? My Life in Blank Verse." She has also printed two family histories: <u>Jacobson Family History Jacob, Jesse and Eugene Jacobson 1722-1998</u> and <u>The Hills</u> (1802-1985) of Upwell, Norfolk England, Waukesha, Wisconsin and Omaha, Nebraska and the Binghams (1784-

1944) and Evisons (1828-1909) of Navenby, Lincoln, England, Waukesha, Wisconsin, and Omaha, Nebraska. She is presently working on a history of the Hales and Burwells of Virginia from Colonial times.

Dory is 76 and just became a greatgrandmother on November 25. She has four children and eight grandchildren. Her oldest daughter married a Virginian who grew up fifty miles from her families' home place in Elk Creek, Virginia.

Edith Lange Smith

Edith was born and raised in Rockville Centre, Long Island, New York where she graduated from South Side High School. She then went on to Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs, New York where she received a BA degree in Liberal Arts in 1949. The following year Edith married Everard Smith who graduated from Princeton University in 1947 after spending three years in the Army.

Everard was a Field Engineer with Sperry Gyroscope and the couple spent the first five years of their married life travelling between New York, Texas, and California. In 1960 the family moved to Littleton, Colorado and have lived here since. Their family of four (three daughters and one son) now includes ten grandsons (four married), and six great-grands. (Fifteen Smiths with one more on the way in March.)

Edith joined CGHS in 1990, volunteered as a Shelf Reader at Bemis Library and worked on the Methodist Church Book. She began her genealogical research with Everard's paternal family who came to the United States in about 1660 and settled in Dorchester County, Maryland. Researching her own roots has been more difficult, as Edith is a first generation American whose father came from Latvia and mother came from Lithuania.

Gary W. Routh (9 September 1942 – 14 February 2010)

Gary Wayne Routh passed away from congestive heart failure on the evening of February 14. Gary, the youngest of three boys, was born September 9, 1942, in Lamar, Colorado, to Earl Randolph Routh and Eva Revenna Lamle. His brothers are Elmer Leroy Routh and his wife, Joan, of Rutherfordton, North Carolina, and Melvin Eugene Routh and wife, Lois, of Castle Rock, Colorado.

After high school Gary enlisted in the U.S. Army and spent four years in England working for the NSA. He went back as a civilian for an additional two years and was able to tour most of Europe. He lived outside of Harrogate, England, very near the area his Routh ancestors lived. He said the cemeteries there were populated with numerous Rouths.

After returning to Colorado, he attended college at Southern Colorado State College in Pueblo and Otero Junior College in La Junta with a leaning towards art classes in which he excelled.

He married Sally Turner in Las Animas in 1971. Sally passed away in 1988. He married Janice LaBorde on March 21, 1993 in Denver. He is survived by his wife Janice; sons Odie (Kristin) of Vermont and Jon (Lisa) of Oregon; brothers, Roy (Joan) of NC and Mel (Lois) of CO; grandchildren Wylie and Cade of OR, Quinn, Elliott and Delia of VT, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Gary worked at Martin Marietta for 13 years then worked for Colorado SuperNet developing websites for a couple of years before going back to work for Lockheed Martin. Jan retired from Lockheed Martin in 2000; Gary retired in 2002.

After retirement Gary and Jan became passionate genealogists, spending most of their time researching information about their ancestors online and making genealogy trips to Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, Nebraska, and the genealogy library in Salt Lake City. Gary compiled a family history of his mother's Lamle family.

Bemis Public Library Bibliography Project

Under the guidance and leadership of Standing Committee Chair, Marilyn Elrod, the editing portion of the Bemis project has been completed on all the records!

This has been a time consuming task as the database includes approximately 4,400 items comprised of books, periodicals, magazines, microfilms, microfiche and miscellaneous vertical files in the Bemis Library collection.

Before you receive this newsletter, Don Elliott will have formatted and placed the records on the CGHS site (www.columbinegenealogy.com.) This will be a great service to genealogists as they will be able to search the website by country, state, county, or subject. The project now moves into a new phase: final check of catalog numbers and titles from a printed copy. After the final check, proofreading will be the last step before publishing the bibliography.

This presents a great opportunity to those members who have not had the privilege of giving their time to a Columbine project. Not only is there great satisfaction in knowing that you have been a contributing member of our society, but as you work with Marilyn, you just might come across some materials that will help you in your research. FamilySearch Online Classes

Several of the FamilySearch Family History Library classes are now available free at FamilySearch.org, There are currently 23 Family History Library classes available online, with subjects ranging from European research to United States military records. The classes vary in length from 6 to 58 minutes, with most lasting about 25 minutes. To view the classes, click on the Free Online Classes link at www.familysearch.org.

Registering Loved Ones Names at the World War II Memorial

Did you know that the names of persons who served in World War II are not automatically added to the beautiful WW II memorial in Washington DC? You may register your own name, the name of a family member or friend. Anyone who served in the armed forces during World War II, and any American who helped on the home front is eligible for the Registry. Home front activities included working in defense-related industries, recycling of materials needed for the war effort and more. You may enter a name in the registry via the internet or by mail. To register a name via the internet, go to www.wwiimemorial.com. Click on the "WWII Registry" button on the left. Follow the online instructions to enter the name you wish to honor. To register a name via mail, call 1-800-639-4992 and a form will be mailed to you with instructions.


