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Wall Busting

Tax records were instrumental for me in breaking down a brick wall that has eluded me for years. I've been searching for my 4th great-grandfather with a common surname of Miller. His son, my 3rd great-grandfather, James, was married in 1821 in Cabell County, now West Virginia. I knew nothing of James prior to his marriage date. There were two potential Miller families in the 1820 census, but I also thought it was possible that James had recently moved there in order to be married. He may have followed his wife-to-be since her family had moved there after the 1820 census, and shortly before their marriage. When I tackled the tax records in Cabell County, I never expected to find so much information.

Early tax records provide more information than it first appears, especially if records for multiple years have survived from the county that you are researching. Taxes were based on wealth – slaves, horses, mules, cattle, carriages, stud horses, watches, furniture, and even icehouses. Most farmers in the early 1800's did not have much wealth. Many were charged taxes based on their owning only one horse (\$.13 each) and nothing else. Regardless of wealth, each taxpayer was asked to state how many males over 16 were in the household. No additional taxes were charged, and perhaps the reason for the question is so the county could predict how many additional taxpayers there would be in the future, when a 16 year old reached adulthood or married.

When a man stated on his tax entry that there were two males over 16 in the household, the following year or two, a new male, his son, showed up on the tax roles by name. At that time, the father's tax information then stated that there was

now only one male over 16 in his household. So the father and son were then both taxpayers. This gives a loose fatherson connection, but also provides the name of the son. One can infer approximate ages for a father and son. If several years of tax lists are available, a second or third son's names could be learned. With names, other reference information becomes more useful, especially census data. A son who turned 16 in the 1820's would likely live until after the 1850 census, when more family information became available on censuses.

There are many other ways to analyze the data on tax lists. The entries are listed alphabetically and by date, and sometimes give a reference to their home location, perhaps mentioning a nearby creek. Family members or neighbors may decide to go to the county seat on the same day to pay their taxes. So people who pay on the same date might be related, regardless of the surname. With the same surname, a relationship becomes more obvious unless it is a common name. However, someone probably always had to stay home to take care of chores and care for livestock, so patterns are not always consistent. Using all this information, though, can tell a researcher about neighbors and family structures. It's also possible to learn an ancestor's possible death date, when they disappear from the tax lists.

In Virginia during the early 1800's, formation of new counties occurred frequently. An ancestor probably didn't move, but the name of the county where he lived might have changed. To track him, it may be necessary to analyze tax lists from different counties. To understand the dates for new counties being formed, I use http://homepages.rootsweb.com/~george/countyformations/virginiaformationmaps.html. This site gives a map of the county name changes, as well as dates and other information.

As a result of all of the above approaches, I found that my 4th great-grandfather was William Miller, who had lived in Cabell County (earlier Kanawha County) since his marriage in 1795. I also learned that his sons are James (my 3rd great-grandfather), Frederick (also known through a DNA match), and Henry. My brick wall was demolished!

Do You Use the Internet Archive?

The Internet Archive has millions of books and resources on history and genealogy for loan or download. Their genealogy collection contains passenger lists, census records, various state marriage and death records and more. This is a valuable resource that everyone should explore. If you can't find something on Google Books, try the Internet Archive. They often have books that even Google doesn't have. And if you do use the Archive, donate! This is a valuable non-profit providing untold wonders. They deserve our support! https://archive.org/details/genealogy?tab=collection

Using FamilySearch "Images"

This is a relatively new research tool from FamilySearch.org to look up historical images and documents that have not yet been indexed, so it's not possible to search by name. You will have to look through the images manually, like you used to when researching films.

To use "Images" to sign into FamilySearch and click on the "Search" tab. Click on "Images" and a new page comes up showing you how many historical documents are being constantly downloaded into FamilySearch files. Type in the area in which you want to search, and you will see a drop-down list of suggestions, which you can accept or leave your query as you typed it. Then click "Search Image Groups."

You will then see what documents have been digitized for the area in which you are searching. If you receive too many hits, you can go back to the first page and. click "Show More Search Options" to add a year or range of years. However, I would recommend you wait until you see what records come up.

You will need to search these records image-by-image, just like looking on a film reader. There may be lots of images on a film or just a few, but this is well worth the effort to fill in your family tree.

Also, if you have your family tree on FamilySearch, you can click on the "Attach to Family Tree" button at the top left to attach the record. Otherwise to download the record to your computer, right click your mouse and choose "Save As."

Be sure to check this research tool out and have fun researching.

Rootstech 2021, A New & Exciting Experience


