Celebrating Columbine's 50th *Anniversary*, 1973-2023

This year we celebrate Columbine's 50th anniversary. Over the next two issues watch for articles about our 50 years as an organization and comments from long-time Columbine members.

The three founding members of the organization were: Geraldine 'Gerry' White, Virginia Rothfus and Barbara Brown who became friends when they took an advanced genealogy class together.

The first meeting was held in Virginia Rothfus' home in Littleton on April 4, 1973. They discussed various names before setting on Columbine Genealogical and Historical Society. They set the dues for 1974-75 at \$3.00 per year. (1973 was pro-rated.)

Barbara became a Certified Genealogy Record Searcher (CGRS) in 1971. Virginia taught genealogy at Arapahoe Junior College and served as Columbine's first president. Gerry was elected the first secretary/treasurer.

This quarterly newsletter has been evolving ever since it began as one typewritten page and has expanded into the 8-12-page issue it is today. In 1993 a bound book containing early membership information and newsletters from 1973 to 1993 was produced.

In August of 1973 Columbine began a partnership with the Bemis Public Library to create a shared genealogy collection which has grown over the years both through purchases the society has made and through member donations. Bemis was also the meeting place for Columbine for many years.

Celebrating Our 50 Years! Comments from Long-Time Members

Watch for interesting articles about our 50 years as an organization and for comments like those below from long-time Columbine members. We will hold a celebration at our April 11th meeting and hope everyone will be able to join us for cake and camaraderie. Stay tuned for more information.

Ann Lisa Pearson - I joined Columbine in September of 1978, which was recorded as 1979, the fifth year that Columbine was organized. At that time the meetings were held at Bemis Public Library in the meeting room. There was a small closet where we had shelves that held the many research books which members could check-out and take home for one month.

Columbine meetings were held on the second and third Tuesdays of the month, except in the summer. The Board met in the morning on the second Tuesday of the month, with our regular meeting at 1:00 p.m. On the third Tuesday of the month, we held meetings dedicated to educational subjects. In 1995 our meeting place changed to the Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit, Centennial, Colorado.



I taught beginning classes for six years. These were in the morning for a two-hour period over seven weeks. At that time the Federal Archives were at the Federal Center in Jefferson County and the class made a trip there as part of the course.

I was elected President of Columbine in 1995 and have held several other offices on the Board through the years. These past years, I have seen many changes and how much Columbine grew in the early years and then declined in recent years. In 2008 when Columbine celebrated 35 years, many members participated in producing the anniversary book. Now 15 more years have passed, and this year we celebrate 50 years as an organization.

Jean Adams – My original genealogical mentor was a summer neighbor in Breckenridge who had been researching her family history for 30 years. She told me, "Start with yourself, create a filing system and join a local genealogical group." I followed her advice and joined a CGHS class in September 2012 at Bemis Library, taught by Ann Lisa Pearson and Marilyn Elrod. I loved what I was learning and joined CGHS for the next year (2013) along with classmates Chris Yaros and Stan Harms.




The following fall a very persuasive CGHS president named CJ Backus talked me into "helping" Allison Gibbens with the position of First VP, Programs. I was still a very new researcher, but CJ was very, very persuasive.

Her suggestions for managing programs was that if you are in charge of finding speakers, why not find speakers for topics <u>you</u> want to learn about? That was great advice and it was fun!

I corresponded with very friendly, knowledgeable speakers who could teach what I wanted to learn.

Just in case there is anyone reading this who feels the same way, I recommend that you volunteer for the position of First VP, Programs or Education Coordinator!

CJ Backus - I have two fond memories because of one of our wonderful presidents, Sandi Klein.





The second memory stems from Sandi wanting a conference; thus, we had the 2010 Symposium with Laura Prescott.

Both of these experiences included many members pitching in to create fun and historical activities for the society to present.

Joyce B. Lohse - Since joining Columbine in 1997, a favorite memory that comes to mind is transcribing and preserving records for the Littleton Cemetery Index project. Connie Strandberg, Joan McGrane and I visited the cemetery office to compare documents with cemetery cards, all handwritten by various people. It was a challenge, a learning experience, and a great time spent with Connie and Joan, visiting the cemetery, and learning more about its permanent residents.



In 2006 and 2012, I enjoyed CGHS research trips to Salt Lake City, which resulted in loads of family data, some of which still requires attention. My favorite meeting presentation was in

about 1999 when Dee Dee Horan spoke about the benefits of studying and collecting postcards. When the postcard-collecting bug bit me hard, the slippery slope led to much enjoyment and a broadened perspective on history.

When I was asked to be president, I resisted due to fear of public speaking, but accepted in order to improve my skills. To make my reports more interesting, I inserted news items, such as one about a moose caught tipping over headstones in a Maine cemetery. I also gained confidence by presenting history programs to the always friendly and forgiving Columbine audience.

Great memories abound with gratitude for them all. Happy 50th Columbine Anniversary.

Bemis was not the only library or historical society to benefit from Columbine donations. Donations also went to the Littleton Historical Museum, the Denver Public Library and to the Stern-NARA Fund.

In October of 1973 the first research trip to the Family History Library in Salt Lake City was organized and became an annual outing for many years.

In November of 1974 a group tea was held to celebrate the end of the year and that evolved into our annual December Holiday Party which now takes place on the second Tuesday in December.

The society was incorporated as a non-profit on June 14, 1976.

Over the years society members have also participated in many local records preservation and publishing projects, all of which can be found at: https://columbinegenealogy.com/records/.

One of these was a huge project to collect, preserve, microfilm, and publish record books for the four oldest churches in Littleton, Colorado. This project took 16 years to complete with the help of 150 volunteers.

In 1982 Columbine sponsored a seminar on British genealogy research by members of the Society of Genealogists from London.

In 1988 CGHS received the National Genealogical Society (NGS) Award of Merit for the Littleton Church Records Project. This was the highest recognition for a local society. Columbine was praised for the scope and quality of the project.

In 1991 our third quarter newsletter announced that the Family History Library in Salt Lake had made an arrangement with the Colorado State Archives to begin filming Colorado records – these consisted of records of various dates, including vital, census, probate, land, military, naturalization, immigration, church, and other records of genealogical value. Colorado genealogical societies were asked to help.

In 1994 Columbine's newsletter received a national first place award from the National Genealogical Society for appearance and content.

In 2008 Columbine held a Genealogy Research Day featuring genealogist and author Colleen Fitzpatrick. This included one of our first sessions on DNA research and genealogy.

Also, in 2008 Columbine produced a publication, *Celebrating Our 35th Anniversary*, 1972-2008, co-edited by Gary W. Routh and CJ Backus. It highlighted our history, activities, achievements, awards and 35th year membership roll.

In 2010 Columbine held a symposium with Laura G. Prescott, president of the Association of Professional Genealogists on finding online images, publishing genealogies online, finding family in academic archives and using manuscripts to create a family history.

In 2011 one of our founders, Barbara Jones Brown, who died in 2008, received the 2011 Memorial Hall of Fame-David S. Vogels Award established by the Colorado Council of Genealogical Societies (CCGS) for significantly contributing to the genealogy field in Colorado in a unique, pioneering, or exemplary way.

In 2013 Anita Burbank-Jenkins formed a Writers' Group for members to research different types of writing, to critique each other's work and give suggestions and support. That group is still going strong today!

Stay tuned for more memories in our spring newsletter, which comes out in April.





Call for Volunteers for Open Board & Committee Positions

We still have several important board and committee positions open and <u>urgently</u> need volunteers to fill these positions for the organization to continue. Current board members will guide and help you get acclimated, so please help your society by volunteering!

Open Board Positions

First VP, Programs - Schedule presenters to speak on genealogical or historical subjects. Whoever takes this position will have a head start as our current programs' VP has already found many speakers for next year and has ideas for others to help you.

Second VP, Publicity - Create publicity program announcements for the CGHS meetings, workshops, and classes with information provided by the Program and Education chair people. Release program announcements to membership and the media. Create, maintain, and update the publicity distribution lists. Distribute the quarterly CGHS Newsletter by email.

Recording Secretary – An office we cannot function without! Responsible for taking minutes of all board and business meetings and for their distribution. Board meetings are by zoom and recorded to aid the secretary in compiling the minutes. Along with President, sign all contracts and documents authorized by the Society.

Membership Coordinator – Collect dues and maintain a record of all members, maintain and distribute new member packets, member nametags and visitors' log; maintain membership database; along with the publicity chair, compile and distributed the membership directory. We have one volunteer, but need one more. Please volunteer and make this a two-person team!

Open Committee Positions

Bulletin Board/Historian - Collect and preserve items of historical interest to the Society, display information of interest on the bulletin board at meetings. Collect records of value to the history of CGHS. Submit Society's records of historical value to Denver Public Library's Manuscript Department along with newsletters, board minutes and annual reports.

Nominations – This is a position for three people who have been active members for one year. Find member candidates for open positions and provide nominated candidate names to the board at the August board meeting.

Photographer – Take photos of speakers, membership and activities at all meetings and events and provide to newsletter and website editors.

Hospitality – Oversee refreshments for all meetings and occasions. Request members to bring refreshments. Purchase supplies. Set up the food counter and direct clean-up of refreshments and kitchen area after meetings. **We have two volunteers, but need one more. Come help these other volunteers!**

Newsletter Proofreader – Proofread the newsletter each quarter for accuracy and report changes to the Newsletter Editor.

An organization is only as strong as its members' participation. Help Columbine continue to be the great society that has grown for 50 years!

The CGHS Writers' Group meets via Zoom each month on the third Wednesday at 10:00 am. The purpose of the group is to encourage each other to write about our families and history.
